In the front of this brochure, you will find important program registration information. In the center is a registration form to remove and mail in or deliver to Trailside. Please register only one child on each form.

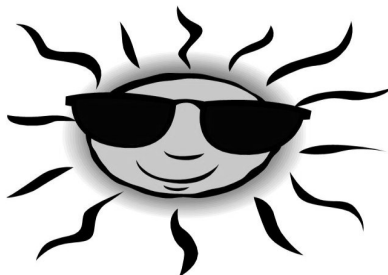
Classes fill quickly, so please register soon, before the programs you want are filled!

SUMMER CAMP REGISTRATION



Registration for residents of Union County for summer camps and family programs will be held on Saturday, March 3, 2012. In order to register, a lottery ticket must be drawn between February 11-24 with proof of residency.

Out of county registration will begin on Monday, March 5th.

REGISTRATION PROCEDURES AND POLICIES

- Registration is required for all programs except where indicated in the program description. Class sizes are limited.
- Registration is in-person or by mail. In-person registration is done at Trailside daily, from 12:00-4:45 PM.
- To register, specify classes on the registration form in the center of this brochure and mail it with your check or deliver it to Trailside. Please use a separate registration sheet for each child. Call Trailside for class space availability *prior* to sending a check or making the trip to Trailside, (908) 789-3670.
- Include your check, made payable to “**County of Union,**” for the appropriate amount.
- Trailside accepts Visa and MasterCard in person only. Credit card payments cannot be accepted over the phone or by mail.
- Classes marked rain or shine are held in the rain unless the weather is severe. Please call Trailside at (908) 789-3670 on the program date to find out if a program has been postponed/cancelled due to inclement weather.
- Trailside reserves the right to cancel a program due to low enrollment or severe weather. In the event of cancellation, a Trailside credit will be issued. Re-scheduling for a rain date is not considered a cancellation.
- Trailside credit will be issued **ONLY** if the program is cancelled by the registrant at least three (3) days in advance **OR** if we can find a substitute from the waiting list. Please call if your child can not attend a program.
- **No refunds will be given for any program.**
- Please be prompt when dropping off or picking up your child. Due to the brief class period of the workshops, it is important to start and end on time.
- Trailside reserves the right to remove a disruptive or inappropriately aged child from a program. If a disruptive or inappropriately aged child is removed from a program, no credit or refund will be offered.
- Each class will spend some time outside (more in nice weather and less in wet or cold weather), so please, dress your child appropriately in boots and a raincoat when necessary. Long pants tucked into socks offer protection from ticks.
- For programs that meet off-site, see the enclosed map or call Trailside for directions.

PRESCHOOL PROGRAMS

TODDLER TIME

Sensory hikes to acquaint adults and children with the natural world.

Dress for outdoors.

BRING: A baby carrier or sling; strollers are **not** recommended.

WHO: Adult with child/children up to three years of age. Older children will not be permitted to attend.

Maximum 4 per class. **Pre-register**

WHEN: Thursdays, 9:30-10:30 or 11:00 am - 12:00 pm
or Fridays, 9:30-10:30 am

MEET: Trailside Visitor Center

DRESS: Appropriately for the weather; if possible, we *will* go outside.

FEE: Per class: IC - \$8/family OC - \$10/family

Feb. 2 or 3: Let it Snow - Learn why snow is important to plants, animals, and people and see how they cope with winter weather. Go on a snowflake scavenger hunt and create your own snow scene to take home.



Feb. 9 or 10: Little Stinkers - Skunks are animal neighbors that are active all year. Discover how skunks keep warm, find food and protect themselves. We will also learn skunk “body language” and make a cute skunk craft to take home.

Feb. 16 or 17: Turtle Talk - Discover what turtles like to eat, where they live, and how they survive during winter. Meet three different species of turtles living at Trailside and learn some interesting facts about these native New Jersey reptiles.

Feb. 23 or 24 : FEBRUARY FESTIVITIES – Winter Snacks for Wildlife- During the winter, food is limited for animals. Learn where they find food and how they manage to keep full bellies through this long season. Make a craft to display and give to the wild animals that live in your backyard.

Mar. 1 or 2: Nature at Night - Explore the habits and habitats of several of our nocturnal neighbors including the owl, opossum and raccoon. Take a walk through the museum to examine these animals closer in our exhibits, then head towards owl prowling grounds and practice hooting like an owl!

Toddler Time continued...

Mar. 8 or 9: Slitherin' Snakes - Learn why snakes are so important to the balance of nature in NJ and the rest of the world. Discover surprising facts about these reptiles and meet live snakes from Trailside's collection! Make a slithery snake craft to take home.

Mar. 15 or 16: Nature's Nests - During the winter months, it's much easier to see where birds and squirrels build their nests. Examine nests from Trailside's collection and hike through the nursery to find nests of different shapes and sizes. Make a nest craft to take home.

Mar. 22 or 23: Animal Clothing - Each animal has a special suit of clothes that's just right for it. Learn about feathers, fur, and scales and walk outside to see how the animals are dressed for the weather.

Mar. 29 or 30: Watchung's Woodland Fairies - Use your imagination to explore the woodland forests for signs of fairies and their homes. Learn all about these mythical creatures that live among the plants and animals of the Watchung Reservation. Make your own fairy house to put in your backyard.

TWO OF US

An interactive program encouraging nature discovery through hikes and other indoor/outdoor activities.

WHO: 3 or 4-year-old child with an adult. **Pre-register.**

Younger and older children will not be permitted to attend this program. Please see Saturday Outdoor Adventures.

WHEN: Tuesdays, 1:30-2:30 PM or Wednesdays, 10 - 11 AM

FEE: Per class: IC - \$8/child & adult OC - \$10/child & adult

Jan. 31 or Feb 1: Groundhog Day - Investigate the burrow of this animal and learn how it spends the cold winter months. Discover what groundhogs are doing on Groundhog's Day. Take a short hike to search for the hidden burrows of local groundhogs.

Feb. 7 or 8: Woodpecker Wonders - Find out about the habits and habitats of the downy, hairy, red-bellied and pileated wood-peckers. Practice catching "bugs" like a wood pecker and discover

Feb. 14 or 15 Winter Wildlife - Discover the special adaptations many animals have developed to cope with cold winter months. Take a walk to look for wintering wildlife and give our wild-life friends a valentine.

Feb. 21 or 22: FEBRUARY FESTIVITIES - Rainforest Romp – Discover the different kinds of plants and animals that live in a rainforest. Measure the amount of rain that falls, listen to tropical sounds and make a paper parrot to take home.

Feb. 28 or 29: The Three Bears – New Jersey has only one bear, the black bear. Find out how black bears live and what they eat. Bring your teddy bear along on a bear hike and discover when bears might visit the reservation.

Mar. 6 or 7 Eggstra, Eggstra - Eggs aren't just for the birds. Discover the variety of animals that hatch from eggs. Examine eggs from Trailside's own collection and decorate an egg to take home.

Mar. 13 or 14: Laughing with Leprechauns – St. Patrick's Day is here, and it's the leprechauns most active time of year! Use your imagination to search for gold. Follow these mythical elves for treasures to hold.

Mar. 20 or 21: Rrriinnggg... – Time to wake up! Sunshine, longer days and warmer temperatures means...SPRING! Hike to look for signs of spring and count the birds, mammals, insects and flowers you find.

Mar. 27 or 28: Seed Sling – Learn about Trailside's wildflower meadow and the animals that make their home there. Make seed balls that will be used to help re-seed the meadow and save some to grow at home.



SMALL FRY DAYS

A drop-off program to foster awareness and appreciation of the natural world through nature hikes, exploration and activities. Dress for outdoors.

WHO: 4-6 year olds. **Pre-register**

Younger and older children will not be permitted to attend this program. Please see Saturday Outdoor Adventures.

WHEN: Tuesdays, 9:45-11 AM *or* Wednesdays, 1:15-2:30PM

FEE: Per class: IC - \$8/child OC - \$10/child

Jan. 31 or Feb. 1: Groundhog Slumber - Do groundhogs predict the weather at this time of year? Explore the world of this burrowing animal and discover how they prepare for the cold winter months.

Feb. 7 or 8: Wacky Woodpeckers - Learn about downy, hairy and red-bellied woodpeckers. Visit the Bird Attraction Area to look for woodpeckers and other winter birds. Discover how woodpeckers use dead trees as fast food restaurants and apartment houses.

Feb. 14 or 15: Frosty Friends – Cold weather can be hard on the animals of the Watchung Reservation. Learn how they survive these cold, winter months. Search outside for homes and hideouts and give a valentine gift to our wildlife friends.

Feb. 21 or 22: FEBRUARY FESTIVITIES - Tropical Rainforests - Investigate a tropical rainforest from forest floor to the top layer, over 200 feet high! Discover the unique sites and sounds associated with this special ecosystem.

Feb. 28 or 29 The Bear Facts - Learn about New Jersey's only bear, the black bear. Discover how bears live, what they eat and if they visit the Watchung Reservation. Bring your teddy bear along on a bear hike.



Small Fry Days Continued...

Mar. 13 or 14: Lucky Leprechauns - St. Patrick's Day is almost here, so the mythical Irish elves must be near! Follow a trail of green, looking carefully for leprechauns to be seen. If we're lucky, so we've been told, we'll find the leprechauns mound of gold.

Mar. 20 or 21: Spring's A-coming - Spring is just around the corner! Spring means more sunshine, warmer temperatures, longer days and animals waking up from long winter naps. Look for signs of spring as we explore the outdoors.

Mar. 27 or 28: Sow the Seeds - Get down and dirty making seed balls. **or 28** Discover the importance of seeds and learn which animals depend on them. Hike to Trailside's wildflower meadow and take turns spreading seeds.

GRADE SCHOOL PROGRAMS

AFTERSCHOOL EXPLORATIONS

A drop off program designed to acquaint your child with nature explorations, hikes and outdoor activities.

WHO: 1st & 2nd graders, **pre-register.**

WHEN: Thursdays, 3:30-4:45 PM

FEE: Per class: IC - \$8/child OC - \$10/child

Feb. 2: Woodchuck Ways - Will the woodchuck see his shadow and predict six more weeks of winter? Learn the legend of Groundhog Day and explore the world of this burrowing mammal who is often mistaken for a beaver. Discover if local groundhogs are active as we investigate known groundhog hideouts.

Feb. 9: Snow Fun - Explore the art and science of a natural winter wonder – snow! Discover how plants and animals depend on snow to survive. Learn interesting snow facts, go on a snowflake hunt and make a snowflake craft to take home.

Feb. 16: Winter Seasonal - Explore the Watchung Reservation in winter. Learn how to identify trees without their leaves and hike the nursery trails to search for deer paths, rabbit tracks and other animal signs.

Afterschool Explorations continued...

Feb. 23: FEBRUARY FESTIVITIES – Behind the Scenes - Learn what it takes to care for Trailside's resident animals. Meet frogs, snakes, turtles and fish up close while learning about their care, behavior and feeding habits.

Mar. 1: Sugaring Off – See how real maple syrup is made from the sap of a sugar maple tree. Find out what equipment is needed to collect and process sap. Take part in a taste test and try to identify the real thing.

Mar. 8: Bird Feeder Frenzy - Take a short walk outdoors to look for our feathered friends. Help fill the feeders in the Bird Viewing Area and learn to identify some common birds by sight and sound. Find out about the different types of seed used to attract birds and make a bird feeder to take home.

Mar. 15: Root to Fruit – Become a botanist, or plant scientist, and investigate the life cycle of a plant. Plant a seed and take it home to watch it grow. Discover how your favorite foods can be traced back to plants and search outside for sprouting plants and trees.

Mar. 22: Headwaters Hike - The headwaters of Lake Surprise is a seldom-visited section of the reservation. Explore this wetland area and search for deer, frogs, turtles, birds and early spring wildflowers. **Meet at Lake Surprise parking lot. See # 6 on map.**

Mar. 29: Keepers of the Trail - Prepare to get down and dirty! Work together to maintain part of Watchung Reservation's trail system. Help enhance wildlife habitat and create brush piles from fallen logs, twigs and branches.



TRAILSIDE EXPLORERS

Back by popular demand! Examine what it takes to survive in the wilderness by learning a new survival skill with each session.

WHO: 3rd-5th grade students, **pre-register.**

WHEN: Alternate Wednesdays, 3:30-4:45 PM

FEES: **Per class:** **IC** - \$8/child **OC** - \$10/child

MEET: Trailside Visitor Center

Feb. 1: Finding Your Way Home – Becoming lost is the most common wilderness survival situation. Discover how to use a map and compass, learn to read trail markers and find your location on a map.

Feb. 15: Gimme Shelter- The most important survival skill, especially in winter, is shelter building. Learn how to build a simple shelter (without the use of tools) that will keep you warm and dry no matter what the weather. In the event of heavy snow, we will learn how to build a snow shelter that is surprisingly warm and comfortable.

Feb. 29: The Secrets of Fire- In a survival situation, fire is a very important tool for warmth, cooking food and purifying drinking water. Discover ways to build a fire even in damp weather. Learn about the responsibilities associated with keeping a safe campfire.

Mar. 14: The Art of Tracking - Learn to identify animals of the Watchung Reservation by the footprints and signs they leave behind. Go on a hike in search of animal tracks and signs.



Mar. 28: Edible & Medicinal Plants- There is a great abundance of plants in the wild that can provide food and medicine in a survival situation. Learn the “big four” plants that can provide food. Take a hike to see the plants that can be used for medicine. Sample beneficial teas made from some of these plants.

A minimum of 10 children are needed to run the workshop.

A maximum of 25 children will be enrolled

Audubon Lecture: Owls of New Jersey

Thursday, February 9, 7-9 PM

Owls are among our most fascinating wildlife. There are eight species of these mostly nocturnal raptors, living in New Jersey, four of which commonly nest here. Dorothy Smullen, teacher/naturalist with the NJ Audubon Society presents an illustrated program which explains the adaptations that make these birds successful hunters. You will have an opportunity to view a few mounted specimens, listen to owl calls and learn to identify their pellets. **Fee:** \$8 IC/ \$10 OC.



Dramatization/Lecture: The Wit and Wisdom of Abraham Lincoln

Friday, February 17, 7-8 PM

Christian Johnson, dramatist with the American Historical Theatre, portrays Lincoln with impressive resonance, giving insight into his strength of character. This revered leader was a team-builder, who created a cabinet of rivals and tested them. Join us for a memorable evening celebrating President's week.

Lecture/Walk: Identifying Five Tracks and Five Trees

Teacher Training Workshop: Environmental Education for Early Learners with PLT/Project WILD

Wednesday, March 14, 9-3 PM

Environmental Education for Early Learners with Project Learning Tree, "PLT," and Project WILD has new programs to reach early learners with hands-on nature investigations. Through sensory activities, music, song and dance, as well as snacks and crafts, students gain an awareness of the natural world. Each workshop participant will receive the award-winning PLT guide and music CD as well as the Project WILD guide, supplemental materials that support the lessons in NJ as well as craft and snack ideas for the classroom. In addition, participants will earn 6 NJDOE credits. Morning refreshments are provided. Bring lunch. There will be some time outdoors. Dress appropriately for the weather. **Fee:** \$25 IC/OC.

Lecture: The Raptor Trust Story

Thursday, March 22, 7:15-8:15 PM

Thousands of injured and orphaned wild birds are nursed back to health at the Raptor Trust. This program offers a behind-the-scenes look at what the Trust does to care for them. The presentation focuses on raptors, for which the center is named. Lauren Butcher, the Trust's Education Director, will discuss common injuries, medical procedures, the seasonal care of baby birds and how various species are cared for. Ms. Butcher will share some of their fascinating stories. One of the Trust's 'avian ambassadors,' a live educational hawk or owl, will be part of the program as well. **Fee:** \$8 IC/ \$10 OC.

JOIN THE TRAILSIDE MUSEUM ASSOCIATION

The Trailside Museum Association (TMA) is Trailside Nature and Science Center's volunteer support group. The mission of this organization is to assist staff in their ongoing efforts to interest and educate people in all phases of nature, science, conservation and related recreation, through funding projects and as volunteers.

TMA was formed in 1956. Members staffed the museum store, provided funds for the construction of a classroom and donated money towards many of the old museum's displays.

More recently TMA funded the construction of the 30-foot American beech tree exhibit, or "tree of life," located in the atrium of the building. Additionally funding was provided for a spotting scope for use in birding programs, a condition assessment of Trailside's taxidermy collection, computerized, interactive kiosks and construction of a "backyard" pond that can be viewed from the Visitor Center.

TMA members will receive a Trailside Newsletter announcing special TMA events, including their annual fall hayride. Articles highlighting seasonal activity in the Watchung Reservation, environmental issues, facility improvements, volunteer achievements and staff biographies are featured in each edition. Members also receive a 20% discount at the museum shop.

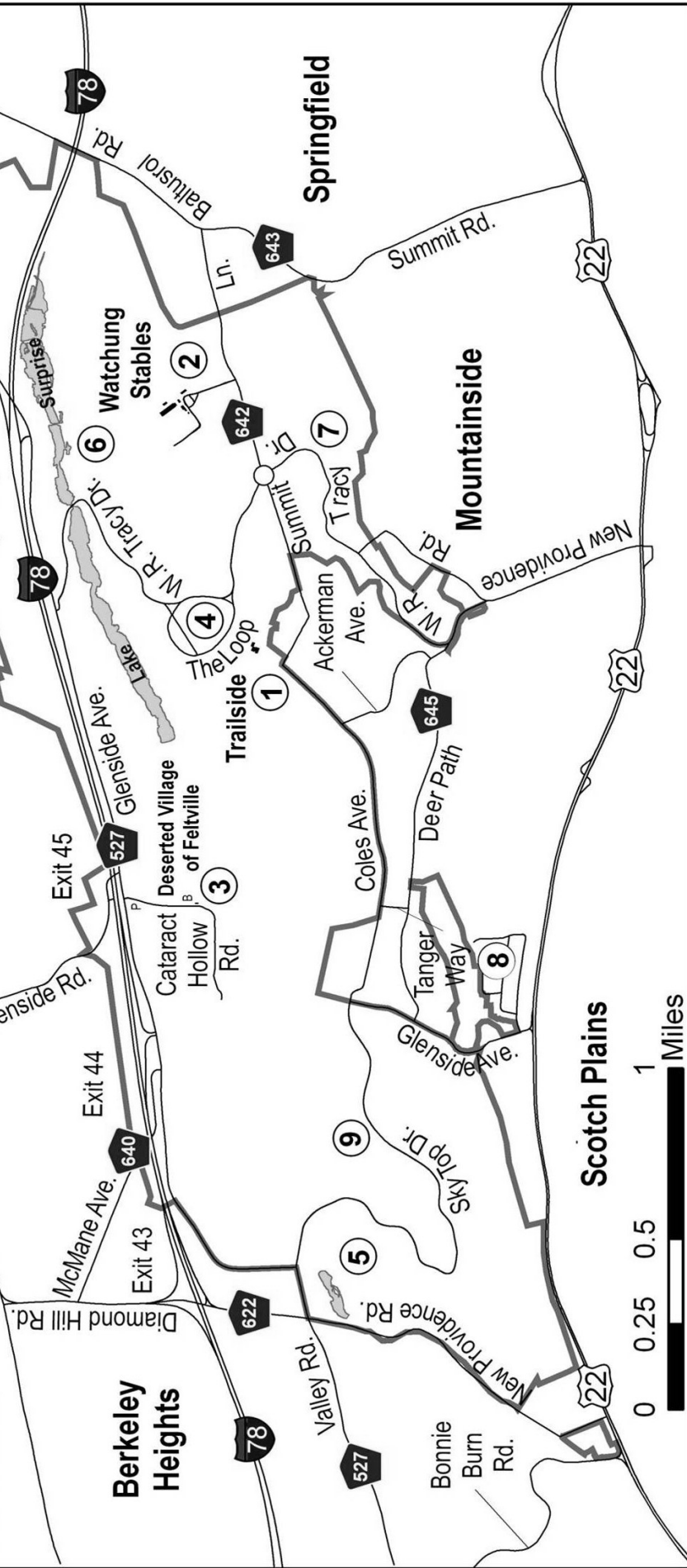
