A Loved One Needs a Guardian. What Happens Next?

This brochure is intended to be a guide for anyone who is considering becoming a guardian or who may for whatever reason have a family member declared incapacitated. When family members have to make this decision it is usually because the person can no longer make decisions about their finances or health care by themselves. It is important that they be protected and this instrument is a way of doing just that. It is intended to protect the

interest of the individual as well as the guardian.



You will need the help of a legal professional to file these proceedings.

The Union County Surrogate wishes to make everyone aware of the necessity to have important legal documents. However, when the need arises the courts are there to help. If there is no next of kin or friend to become the guard-

ian the court may require that the Office of the Public Guardian become involved. It is not a decision to take lightly and requires that certain disclosures be made. It requires that the person who is going to need a guardian undergo at least 2 medical or psychological exams within 30 days of filing a complaint in the Surrogate's Court. Strict rules govern the court proceedings and this brochure is intended to give you a perspective of what to expect during the process.

The Surrogate's Court will follow the case closely. Court monitors will be sent out after a decision is made by the courts to check the progress of the incapacitated person. Yearly court reports are required to be filed by the guardian and their duties should not be taken lightly.
