

- **Feb. 7, 8 or 9 To Den or Not to Den** Winter is a tough time for wildlife. Animals adapt to the cold in different ways. Learn which of our animal neighbors sleep all winter while others "vacation" in warmer places.
- Feb. 14, Animals Do The Craziest Things Heart shaped candies and Valentine's cards are nothing compared to the show that nature puts on in the name of love! Explore some of the flashiest and strangest ways that animals compete for a mate. Make a craft to bring home for some one you love.
- **Feb. 21, Patterns in Nature** Learn about the honeycombs in a beehive, spots on a bird and stripes on a snake. Search the reservation for these lovely and important signs of repetition. Create your own pattern craft to take home.
- Feb. 28, Maple Sugaring Sugar maple sap is collected in February and March and is used to make delicious maple syrup Hug a maple tree to see if it is big enough to give sap and find out what equipment is needed to collect it. Take part in a taste test and find out if you like the real thing.
- Run, Fly or Swim Away Discover some of the amazing tricks animals use to avoid being eaten. Have fun trying out ways agility, speed and quick-thinking allow animals to stay safe and survive in the wild.

Mar. 14, Tropical Treasures - Heat up the winter months by 15 or 16 discovering interesting facts about the mystical rainforests around the world. Learn why these forests are important and what you can do to protect them.

Mar. 21 Give a Hoot - Learn the secrets of New Jersey's owls:
22 or 23 what they look like, how they hunt, what they eat and what they sound like. Practice owl calls and make your own owl to take home.

Feb 23 Sap to Syrup/Tree ID - Sensory Trail (0.5 mi)


Ever wondered where maple syrup comes from? During this hike kids will learn how to identify the legendary Sugar Maple, along with other native trees of the area, and discover the process of properly tapping a tree for that sugary sap.

Mar 2 Building with Snow - Boy Scout Field (0.5 mi)

A short hike down the hill to the Boy Scout Field will be followed by some snow-building to explore the science of snow.

Mar 9 Life Under Ice - Hike to lake and streams (2 mi.)

Although it seems impossible for life to exist in our water ways in the dead of winter, our lakes and streams are actually full of life. Life under the ice is a slow one. Kids will explore around Lake Surprise and the Blue Brook.

Mar 16 - Tracking Animals - Green-Yellow Trail (1.5 mi.)

Winter is a great time of year to look for tracks, scat, and other signs that animals have left behind. Kids can try their hands at identifying these critters with the help of guidebooks and instructors.

Mar 23 - Winter Survival Methods - Orange-Blue Trail (2 mi.)

Hibernation, brumation, coat color, diet are just a few of the amazing adaptations animals have that help them survive in our temperate climate. As we think about how wildlife has adapted to survive, we will brainstorm how humans too have figured out how to survive the winter months.

Mar 30 - Winter Birding - Orange-Blue Connection-Pink Trail (3 mi.) Migratory birds from the north join our year-round resident bird populations in the winter. This week, we will go in search of all

things birds!

Eagle Cam Teacher Training Workshop Thursday, March 7

9:00 AM - 2:00 PM

The bald eagle population in New Jersey continues to soar largely due to the work of biologists from the NJ Endangered & Nongame Species Program and Conserve Wildlife Foundation of NJ.

Grade school teachers can learn more about the habits & habitats of bald eagles and how to bring these charismatic raptors into their classroom through the use of CWF's live cams. CWF and NJ State Biologist for eagles, Larissa Smith will help teachers understand the science behind NJ's bald eagle population and the adaptations that make them unique. CWF Education Director Stephanie DAlessio will help teachers to discover the many ways eagle ecology can be used across their curriculum for STEM lessons.

Live birds of prey will make an appearance. Earn five (5) professional education credits. A light morning snack and lunch will be served. Class is limited so enroll early.
