THURSDAY, APRIL 28, 2022 AGENDA SETTING MEETING MINUTES

CALL TO ORDER

Chair Williams presided over the meeting and called the meeting to order at 6:08 P.M.

ROLL CALL

Roll call showed Chair Rebecca Williams, Vice Chair Christopher Hudak, Commissioner James E. Baker Jr., Commissioner Sergio Granados, Commissioner Bette Jane Kowalski, Commissioner Lourdes M. Leon, Commissioner Alexander Mirabella, and Commissioner Kimberly Palmieri-Mouded were present with Commissioner Angela R. Garretson absent.

Also present were County Manager Edward T. Oatman, County Counsel Bruce H. Bergen Esq., and Clerk of the Board James E. Pellettiere.

PRAYER AND SALUTE TO THE FLAG

The prayer and salute to the flag were led by Clerk of the Board Pellettiere.

STATEMENT OF COMPLIANCE WITH THE OPEN PUBLIC MEETINGS ACT

PRESENTATIONS BY THE BOARD

Sheriff Corvelli spoke relative to the recent passing of Union County Lieutenant David Pepe and asked for a moment of silence.

There were no questions or comments by the Board.

DEPARTMENT OF ENGINEERING, PUBLIC WORKS & FACILITIES MANAGEMENT Joseph Graziano, Director

- 1. Authorizing the County Manager to award a contract to Netta Architects, Mountainside, New Jersey to provide Architectural Services for the New Annex Courthouse Roof Replacement, City of Elizabeth, County of Union, New Jersey for an amount not to exceed \$54,300.00 (Union County Engineering Project Number 2022-003). (Commissioner Lourdes M. Leon)
- 2. Authorizing the County Manager to award the proposed contract obtained through advertised public bidding in accordance with the Local Public Contracts Law N.J.S.A. 40A:11-1 et seq.,: Department of Engineering, Public Works and Facilities Management, Division of Public Works to Smith-Sondy Asphalt Construction Co. Inc, Wallington, NJ for the 2022 Road Resurfacing Project, Various municipalities, County of Union, New Jersey for an amount not to exceed \$9,532,207.98 subject to the approval of the New Jersey Department of Transportation (BA# 1-2022; Union County Engineering Project # 2020-010). Vice Chair Hudak asked Director Graziano to provide an overview of this item and asked whether or not night paving would be used for this project.

Director Graziano advised that this project included approximately 18.41 miles of road within 15 of the 21 municipalities, adding that this was one of the biggest road resurfacing projects the County had undertaken in a while. He noted that the item had gone out to bid and the Department had received seven bids, adding that the top three bids were within \$100,000 of each other. He spoke relative to the cited vendor, noting that they had previously worked with this vendor on another project. He further advised that the specs of this project were slightly different as they would be addressing portions of the intersecting streets as well. He added that while his Department preferred night paving, the affected

municipalities would have the final say as to when paving was done. He noted that relative to this project, all towns had asked for paving to be done during the day.

Authorizing the County Manager to grant permission to the State of New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection and/or its contractors to enter upon certain property at Cedar Brook Park, known as Block 732, Lot 1 in the City of Plainfield, County of Union for the purpose to install, operate and maintain 3 piezometers. Meters need to be installed due to the changes in the ground water levels related to pumping water from the nearby Middlesex Water Company site facility. (Commissioner Lourdes M. Leon)

Chair Williams asked Director Graziano to elaborate on this item.

Director Graziano advised that this item related to an issue in the Plainfield area relative to rising groundwater that has subsequently affected hundreds of homes in the area. He added that the issue stemmed from Middlesex County Water who had stopped using wells in that area causing the groundwater to rise to unprecedented levels. He advised that through the efforts of NJ State Senate President Nicholas P. Scutari and County Manager Oatman, the County of Union as well as NJ's DEP had been allowed on-site at Cedar Brook Park to assess the situation, adding that DEP had installed monitoring wells to monitor the groundwater levels. He also added that Plainfield Mayor Adrian O. Mapp and Assemblywoman Linda Carter as well as members of the County administration had been on-site to inspect the area and meet with affected residents, noting damage to nearby homes and the need to shut down certain areas of nearby parks. He further advised that Middlesex Water Company was supposed to install a temporary pump within the next month that would allow 2 million gallons of water to be pumped daily, adding that this was a small fraction of what was typically pumped in the past. He noted that within a year, he expected Middlesex Water Company to have all the necessary resources in place to run as customary. He advised that the issue related to changes in NJ's regulations on the treatment of groundwater and drinking water. He advised that Middlesex Water Company was now purchasing water from American Water Company as a result of these regulation changes. He added that the County, with the help of DEP, was committed to move this transition along as fast as possible to mitigate the effects.

Commissioner Baker asked if this issue was affecting other municipalities in the area.

Director Graziano advised that he had personally gone to areas of Middlesex County on the other side of the Middlesex Water Company plant, noting that he was not aware of any issues in South Plainfield. He added that the issue seemed to mainly affect Plainfield residents and hundreds of homes in the area as well as a nearby senior center. He advised that Union County was first notified of this issue in December and the County had been quick to respond to the very serious and potentially dangerous problem. He noted that the yards along Park Avenue were filled with approximately 4-6 inches of water.

County Manager Oatman advised that Plainfield Mayor Mapp had held a town hall recently to discuss the issue that was proving problematic to homeowners in the area.

Director Graziano advised that one homeowner he spoke with spent approximately \$20,000 to install four sump pumps that were running 24/7.

Commissioner Baker asked if contaminants were part of this issue or if it was a matter of backed-up water.

Director Graziano advised that Middlesex Water Company was responsibly for pumping and treating groundwater for use by residents, adding that the company had pumped approximately 8-12 million gallons of groundwater daily for well over a century. He added that this water was unsafe to drink until it was treated properly and with the changes in State regulations on drinking water, the company had shut off operations without realizing the extreme impact it would have on the surrounding areas.

Commissioner Kowalski noted a recent report about contaminates in the water in several towns and asked if this issue was related to that report.

Director Graziano confirmed that the two issues were related. He advised that POFA levels were higher than necessary which required changes to the treatment process. He added that he believed Clark had been the only municipality affected within Union County. He confirmed that for the time being Middlesex Water Company was buying water from American Water to ensure the safety of the water being provided to residents.

Commissioner Kowalski asked Director Anderson to elaborate on this item.

Director Anderson advised that this additional revenue came from CARES ACT funding as well as other federal and local sources and aimed to assist seniors and caregivers in maintaining independence by providing home care, meals, and transportation, along with other resources. She added that this item reflected the first year of the Area Plan Contract Spending Plan that would extend until 2024.

2. Amending Resolution 2021-861 to de-obligate \$250,000.00 from the 2022 United Way of Greater Union County Family Support and Prevention (FSP) Program. (Commissioner Sergio Granados)

Chair Williams asked Director Anderson to elaborate on this item.

Director Anderson advised that this item correlated with Item No. 3 and would de-obligated funding for the United Way of Greater Union County's FSP Program. She noted that due to COVID-19 and other issues, the Department had a need to extend the contract year, which would de-obligate \$250,000 from one period, adding that Item No. 3 would add an additional \$125,000 to the program. She advised that the program was funded by the Department of Children and Families and the County contracted with United Way to provide flex-funds and counseling to specific communities within Union County.

- 3. Amending Resolution Number 2021-0157, a contract with the United Way of Greater Union County for the 2021 Union County Family Support and Prevention (FSP) Program to reflect a six (6) month extension to the contract through June 30, 2022 and to increase the contract amount by \$125,000.00 for a new total contract not to exceed \$375,000.00 (Commissioner Sergio Granados)
