- B. Finance.

ARTICLE XVI, Department of Human Services

[Amended 7-18-1991 by Ord. No. 337; 6-20-2002 by Ord. No. 553; 4-10-2003 by Ord. No. 569; 9-14-2006 by Ord. No. 636; 4-30-2015 by Ord. 2015-764]

§ 1-90. General purpose; departmental organization.

- . There shall be a Department of Human Services for the purpose of promoting the coordination, integration, maximization and development of human services and providing for the planning, monitoring and administration of select human services. Such resources and services shall include, but not be limited to, those mandated by federal and state law and rules and regulations appertaining thereto. The Director of Human Services shall be the head of the Department and shall be responsible to the County Manager for its operation. The office staff of the Director shall include, but not be limited to, the Office of Paratransit, the George W. Herlich Juvenile Detention Center, the Office of Employment Services and Training, the Cornerstone Behavioral Health Hospital of Union County and the Union County Office on Women.
- George W. Herlich Juvenile Detention Center. The Superintendent of the Juvenile Detention Center shall be the head of this facility and shall be responsible to the Director of Human Services for its operation. Under the direction of the Superintendent, the Juvenile Detention Center's functions and responsibilities shall include:
 - (1) Providing for the temporary care (detention), in a physically restricting facility, of juveniles awaiting court disposition, in accordance with state law and rules and regulations appertaining thereto.
- Under the direction and supervision of the Director of Human Services, the Office of Employment Services and Training's functions and responsibilities shall include:
 - () Providing job training and employment opportunities for economically

- disadvantaged, unemployed and underemployed persons and assuring that training and other services lead to maximum employment opportunities and enhanced self-sufficiency pursuant to authorizing federal legislation and rules and regulations appertaining thereto.
- () Collecting, compiling and analyzing statistical data relating to programmatic activity of the Division.
- () Preparing all mandated statistical programmatic reports.
- () Disseminating programmatic reports to appropriate agencies and officials.
- () Recruiting eligible participants to ensure compliance with authorizing federal legislation.
- () Initial screening and intake of individuals eligible for participating in the program.
- () Counseling of program participants for development of prospective employability plans, development of said plans and monitoring of program participants' progress in meeting said plans.
- () Developing jobs, including location and negotiation of employment positions for program participants.
- () On-the-job training (OJT) including development and negotiation of OJT contracts.
- () Directing placement of program participants in employment positions.
- () Educating and training of program participants to facilitate their employability and eventual unsubsidized employment.
- () Performing such other duties as may be required by the Director of Human Services.
- D. Assistant Director. The Assistant Director of the Department of Human Services shall:
 - () Under the direction and supervision of the Director of Human Services, assist in the orderly and efficient administration of the Department of Human Services, performing whatever supervisory or administrative duties the Director of the Department of Human Services deems necessary and proper.
 - () Assure that all contract procurement and contract monitoring conforms to state and federal requirements.
 - () Serve as the Acting Director of the Department of Human Services during the temporary absence or disability of the Director of the Department of Human Services.
- E. Under the direction and supervision of the Assistant Director of Human Services, the Bureau of Veteran's Affairs' functions shall include:
 - (1) Providing information and advocacy for veterans and their families.
 - (2) Coordinating flag placement on all veterans' graves.
- F. The Department of Human Services shall consist of the following divisions:
 - (1) The Division of Aging.
 - (2) The Division of Youth Services.
 - (3) The Division of Planning.
 - (4) The Division of Social Services.
 - (5) The Division of Cornerstone Behavioral Health Hospital.
- G. Under the direction and supervision of the Director of the Department of Human Services, the Union County Office on Women functions and responsibilities shall include:
 - (1) Providing information to women in need of access to government services and resources.
 - (2) Shall serve as a referral source, an advocate and to coordinate programing such as "UC Women Means Business", the Rape Crisis Center and the UC Commission on the Status of Women.

ARTICLE XVII, Department of Administrative Services

§ 1-98. General purpose; departmental organization.

[Amended 12-11-1997 by Ord. No. 458; 6-20-2002 by Ord. No. 553; 3-10-2005 by Ord. No. 611; Amended 12-19-2013 by Ord. 2013-755]

There shall be a Department of Administrative Services for the purpose of conducting personnel management and labor relations, purchasing, coordinating and monitoring the administration of all County insurance programs, motor vehicle fleet management, mailroom & messenger services and telecommunication services. The Director of Administrative Services shall be the head of the Department and shall be responsible to the County Manager for its operation. There may be a Deputy Director of the Department of Administrative Services who shall under the direction and supervision of the Director of the Department of Administrative Services assist in the orderly and efficient administration of the Department, performing whatever supervisory or administrative duties the Director deems necessary and proper.

The Department of Administrative Services shall include the following:

- (1) The Division of Personnel Management and Labor Relations.
- (2) The Division of Purchasing.
- (3) The Division of Motor Vehicles and Telecommunications.
- (4) The Bureau of Asset Management and Labor Compliance.

§ 1-99.4. Bureau of Asset Management and Labor Compliance

[Added 12-19-2013 by Ord. 2013-755]

- A. There shall be under the direction and supervision of the Director of the Department of Administrative Services, the Bureau of Asset Management and Labor Compliance. The functions of the Bureau of Asset Management and Labor Compliance shall be:
 - (1) To document the requirements and responsibilities necessary for the effective management of assets required to support departmental objectives within Union County Government.
 - (2) To inventory County assets which will be subject to its jurisdiction; maintain a central data base wherein assets will be inventoried; provide a mechanism for identification of assets and their location within the County and account for all additions and subtractions to County assets to prevent the loss of County assets.
 - (3) To ensure that the County vendor's comply with all applicable Federal, State and Local Government labor standards and requirements.
 - (4) To administer and manage the equipment maintenance service contract(s).
- B. Bureau head. The Bureau Chief of Asset Management and Labor Compliance shall be the head of the Bureau and shall be responsible to the Director of the Department of Administrative Services for its operation.

ARTICLE XVIII, Department of Parks and Recreation

§ 1-100. Department established; purpose; organization.

A. General Purpose; Departmental Organization. There shall be a Department Parks and Recreation for the purpose of the development of recreational programs and the development and maintaining of public parks, playgrounds, recreational places and facilities, the

- Watchung Reservation and open space within the County of Union. The Director shall be fully responsible for the Department's operation.
- B. There may be a Deputy Director who shall be responsible to the Director of the Department of Parks and Recreation.
- C. The Department shall have an Office of Cultural and Heritage Affairs.

The Office of Cultural and Heritage Affairs functions and responsibilities shall include:

- (1) Create, support and encourage programs promoting public interest and participation in local arts, history and culture.
- (2) Maintain an annual preservation awards program commending noteworthy historic preservation.
- (3) Educate the public on local, state and municipal efforts to preserve historical sites.
- (4) Maintain an historic inventory as a resource for federal and state agencies and local planners.

Chapter 44, DEPARTMENT HEAD QUALIFICATIONS

[HISTORY: Adopted by the Board of Chosen Freeholders of the County of Union 8-26-1976 as Res. No. 472-76. Title amended 4-10-2003 by Ord No. 569. Other amendments noted where applicable.]

§ 44-1. Enumeration of qualifications.

The Board of Chosen Freeholders of the County of Union hereby sets forth below the qualifications for persons to be appointed as department heads in the County of Union:

- . *County Counsel*. The County Counsel shall be an attorney admitted to practice law in the State of New Jersey and shall have at least five years' experience in the practice of law in New Jersey.
- . Administrative Services. The Director of the Department of Administrative Services shall have attained a degree from an accredited college institution in the field of personnel or public administration or a law degree or, in lieu thereof, shall have at least five years of responsible professional supervisory experience
- . *Economic Development*. The Director of the Department of Economic Development shall have attained an educational equivalent of a bachelor's degree in economics, business, urban or regional planning, or a related field from an accredited college institution and shall be able to organize, develop, coordinate and administer the economic development and planning objectives and activities of the County. [Amended 9-9-1976 by Res. No. 534-76; 4-10-2003 by Ord. No. 569]
- Correctional Services. The Director of the Department of Correctional Services shall have proven background in adult corrections with at least seven (7) years progressively responsible leadership, with at least four (4) of those years in a managerial or supervisory capacity. The Director of Correctional Services shall have attained a college or university degree in the areas of Criminal Justice, Social Science, Public or Business Administration or related areas from a recognized and accredited institution, or an equivilant combination of education and experience may be substitued.
- . *Human Services*. The Director of the Division of Human Services shall have attained a bachelor's degree from an accredited college institution in the field of psychology, sociology, social work, public administration or in any other field related to the administration of social service programs or shall have at least five years of commensurate experience in a supervisory capacity in related fields. [Amended 4-10-2003 by Ord. No. 569]
- . Finance. The Director of the Department of Finance shall have attained a college degree from a recognized and accredited college institution and shall have at least five years'

- experience in which supervision of fiscal affairs shall have been his major responsibility and shall possess a Certified County Finance Officer' License. He shall likewise possess a working knowledge and understanding of modern accounting and auditing plans and the law relating to the budgetary process of government.
- Engineering, Public Works and Facilities Management. The Director of the Department of Engineering, Public Works and Facilities Management shall have attained a college degree from a recognized and accredited institution, or shall have had five years' management experience in this area, and shall have at least five years' supervisory experience in the function and operations of public works or be a registered professional engineer with at least three years' experience in such fields. - . *Public Safety*. The Director of the Department of Public Safety shall have a college degree from a recognized accredited institution or, in lieu thereof, have at least five years' proven demonstrable ability in security, public safety, public works or building security, security systems or commensurate training and experience.
- Parks and Recreation. The Director of the Department of Parks and Recreation shall have attained a bachelor's degree from an accredited college or university in the field of public administration, recreational management or any other field related to the management of public park and recreation systems, and shall have at least five years of commensurate experience in a supervisory capacity. The Director shall have a thorough working knowledge and understanding of public park and recreational systems, supported by understanding of and training or education in related fields of business management, modern business practices and enterprise management. Chapter 64, (RESERVED)

Chapter 138, VEHICLES AND TRAFFIC

§ 138-7. Reserved parking.

[Amended 12-10-1992 by Ord. No. 371; amended 1-28-2009 by Ord. No 681-2009]

- The locations as provided for in Schedule V (§ 138-35) are hereby designated as reserved parking spaces. Reserved parking spaces as may be established by the Department of Public Safety shall be used only by persons who have been issued special vehicle identification cards. No other person shall be permitted to park in these spaces as shown on the sketches attached to and made a part of this chapter.
 - Unauthorized parking; restricted access.
 - B1. The practice of persons parking in spaces under the Union County Administration Building produces the potential for a most serious safety hazard in the event of a fire or accident in this area. This location is hereby designated as an area which may be used only by persons who have been issued special vehicle identification cards issued by the Department of Public Safety and/or Clerk of the Board, No other persons are authorized to utilize such area. Any person who shall violate the provisions of this section shall, upon conviction, be punished by a fine not to exceed \$100 for each and every offense. [Added 6-25-1998 by Ord. No. 474]

CHAPTER 140, CONTRACTED OFF-DUTY EMPLOYMENT OF LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS

[Adopted 3-10-2016 by Ord. No.

§ 140 OFF-DUTY WORK BY LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS

The County of Union ("County") establishes the following policy and procedures relating to the performance of services by off-duty law enforcement officers at events held on County Property.

A. General Provisions

- 1. Officers shall be permitted to perform police-related services for private entities or persons ("applicants") at events held on County property during off-duty hours and at such times that such services will not interfere with the efficient performance of regularly scheduled or emergency duties for the County.
- 2. All services performed by off-duty officers serving in the Union County Police, the Union County Sheriff's Office, or the Union County Department of Corrections shall be in his/her official capacity as an employee of the County and shall be subject to the control and supervision of the Director of Public Safety, the Union County Sheriff, or the Director of Correctional Services, or their designees, as applicable.
- 3. Officers performing off-duty police-related services shall be in full uniform unless otherwise approved by the Director of Public Safety, the Union County Sheriff, or the Director of Correctional Services, or their designees, as applicable.
- 4. The Director of Public Safety, the Union County Sheriff, or the Director of Correctional Services, or their designees, may preclude any officer in his or her charge from working any such off-duty assignment. The Director of Public Safety, the Union County Sheriff, or the Director of Correctional Services, or their designees, shall also have the right to order any off-duty assignment to be terminated.

B. Costs and Fees

- 1. To assure the timely payment of wages to officers who perform off-duty services, the Director of the Department of Finance shall establish a trust fund known as the "Jobs in Blue Employment Trust Account," which trust fund shall be dedicated for the receipt of costs and fees collected from applicants. The Jobs in Blue Employment Trust Account ("Trust Account") shall be administered by the Department of Finance.
- 2. Applicants shall estimate the number of hours of service required, which estimate must be approved or disapproved in writing by the Director of Public Safety, the Union County Sheriff, or the Director of Correctional Services, or their designees. A copy of said approval or disapproval shall be forwarded to the Director of the Department of Finance. If services are approved, the applicant shall forward payment to the Department of

Finance for the total estimated hours of service prior to the commencement of any work. The Director of the Department of Finance shall deposit said payment into the Trust Account. Any unused portion of the deposit shall be returned or credited. Any amounts owed for services in excess of the estimate shall be paid within 48 hours of the event.

- 3. No officer shall provide any services for more hours than are estimated without the prior approval of the Director of Public Safety, the Union County Sheriff, or the Director of Correctional Services, or their designees, as applicable.
- 4. Services shall be performed, and officers shall be paid, at a rate of \$55 per hour. Payment shall be made through the County's payroll process in accordance with its regular practices. No officer shall be paid directly by any applicant.
- 5. The County shall charge an additional 10% administrative fee for such work performed by its employees.
- 6. County vehicles shall not be used during the performance of off-duty police-related services unless authorized by the Director of Public Safety, the Union County Sheriff, or the Director of Correctional Services, or their designees. The County shall impose a vehicle use fee of \$50 for a patrol vehicle and \$100 for an ambulance.

C. Public Emergency

The Director of Public Safety, the Union County Sheriff, or the Director of Correctional Services, or their designees, shall have the authority to order any officer engaged in off-duty assignments within the County to respond to an emergency situation within the County. In the event that an officer is assigned to an emergency situation in the County, the applicant shall not be responsible for the payment of the officer's hourly rate, administrative fee or any other fees to the County until such time as said officer returns to the off-duty assignment.

D. Indemnification

To the fullest extent permitted by law, the applicant shall indemnify, defend, and hold harmless the County, its agents and employees, from and against all claims, damages, losses, liabilities, and expenses, including but not limited to attorney's fees and court costs arising out of, resulting from or in any way relating to either directly or indirectly the services of the officer.

PUBLIC COMMENT PORTION

This meeting is open to the public for the purposes of commenting on any governmental issue that a member of the public feels may be of concern to the residents of the county.

Maria Echavarria, Elizabeth, spoke about the Welfare system and on a matter where she signed papers. She claims that she was not allowed to read the documents before she signed them. She stated that they are retaliating against her because of an issue she had with the Prosecutor's Office a few years back. She said she received a letter on February 16th and had 10 days to appear in court and she appeared on February 26th (the deadline date) and they advised her that she had been sanctioned and was unable to receive any help by the legal aid. She said the documents that she signed stated that she owns property, but she claims that she does not and they want to stop her benefits. She said she went to the fair hearing, but the Judge would not listen.

Ms. Echavarria stated that she was told to go for more therapy and said it is not up to the Welfare system to tell her she needs therapy.

Mike Wadik, Summit, Representative of the Summit Tax Association, stating that the City of Summit will be passing the school budget that evening with a 1.5% school tax increase. He asked why the County's increase is over 3% and asked the increase remained within the State mandated 2% cap.

Chairman Bergen stated that the information in the Executive Budget is not final. He said currently, they are in the process of budget hearings where the public will have the opportunity to speak. He said the last hearing will most likely be held in April.

Chairman Bergen explained further that the 2% cap is mandated for municipalities and the County is required to comply with one of the two mandated caps. He said the County is utilizing the cap which is below the cap law.

Rhonda McClain, Springfield, Union County Social Services Board, made comments regarding the new scanning system that will be put in place at the Social Services Offices for employee's time. She stated that there is inadequate parking and made suggestions on how to relieve the issue. She said they do not have designated parking, and as a result does not agree with being marked late after five minutes of being tardy.

FREEHOLDER REPORTS AND COMMENTS

Freeholder Hudak stated that the National Consumer Protection is celebrating its 16th Annual National Consumer Protection Week which runs through March 12th. He encourages the County residents and business owners and managers to learn more about avoiding scams and understanding consumer rights. He said the Union County Office of Consumer Affairs has the mission of helping to protect consumers' rights. He said if there is a business located in Union County that has violated your rights under the Consumer Fraud Act. He encourages the public to start a process of a resolution by filing a formal complaint with the office of Consumer Affairs.

Freeholder Hudak stated that in reference to the comments made by the speaker from Summit. He stated the Board has dealt with a tremendous budget deficit and layoffs in 2012, but the Board has been able to reinvest in the County and continue service levels and maintaining staff since then. He said our infrastructure and transportation is deteriorated. He said the County is in a good financial place and are making prudent decisions over the past 4 years. We cannot say we cannot continue to

invest in Union County is an irresponsible decision. We will be going through the budget and will try to get the number down. He said he looks forward to having discussions until the final budget adoption.

Freeholder Kowalski stated that regarding the Budget, the County represents 21 municipalities together carries the responsibility and the expense of expensive items, such as County has the expenses of the Jail, Courthouse and building the new family courthouse and is needed for the security and maintenance of the County. There are parks, county roads, major roads got cleared first. She said sometimes the State does not provide funding to benefit the County, which creates challenges for us and in the fiscal committee we are making economies where possible, but not at the cost of the well-being of our residents.

Freeholder Kowalski said she was pleased to join Mayor Bollwage, Freeholders, State officials, doctors from Trinitas Hospital and the New Jersey Transportation Planning Authority to kick off a pedestrian safety campaign in Elizabeth this week, during an event at Union County College. She said the Street Smart NJ campaign is aimed at combat distracted driving and walking.

Freeholder Kowalski stated that the program began in 2013 with five pilot sites and it has expanded to include 12 community partners this year, including the City of Elizabeth. She said the campaign urges motorists and pedestrians to check your vital signs because pedestrian safety is vital to the well-being of all in the community. She said the signs for motorists are "Stop for Pedestrians" and "Obey the Speed Limit" and the signs for pedestrians are "Wait for the Walk and Use Crosswalks." She also stated that there is a fifth message, targeting both drivers and pedestrians, stating "Head up, Phones Down." Freeholder Kowalski stated that these signs are critical and doing so could prevent crashes and save lives.

Freeholder Kowalski stated that last week Read Across America events were held throughout the County. She thanked Ms. Laskowsky and her 4th grade class at the Queen Charter School of Plainfield for allowing them to read to the students. She said that she, Freeholder Carter and Freeholder Granados had the pleasure of reading to different classes throughout the school. She said the students were smart, well-informed and asked great questions. She also thanked Ms. Callen, 2nd grade teacher of Linden School #10. She said it was great reading Dr. Seuss books with them and they too were also bright and well-informed.

Freeholder Kowalski thanked the NJEA volunteers for organizing the event at the Barnes and Noble Book Store.

Freeholder Carter announced that our Division of Youth Services is hosting a special public discussion of cyber bullying on Wednesday, March 30th from 5:30 to 8:00 pm at the Peterstown Community Center in Elizabeth. She said the event, titled "Bullying and Our Children" is aimed at fostering a greater understanding of cyber bullying in order to help young people use the internet safely, without far of harassment. She said since many kids are reluctant to report being bullied online, even to their parents, it is impossible to know just how many are affected. She said that we need to educate our children and ourselves.

Freeholder Carter said this is a very important conversation which will open lines of communication for families to proactively discuss the issues teens and pre-teens can face on a daily basis.

Freeholder Carter announced that later this month, UC Step service project that was developed in Union County, called "Garment and Gear" will run for a couple of months and she urged everyone

to support our youth. She said She said Garment and Gear was voted on and there will be some information forthcoming and urged the public to give back to the community.

Freeholder Carter also announced that March is Women's History Month and thanked the past volunteers and future volunteers.

Freeholder Carter stated that she participated in Read Across America and thanked the administration at Jefferson School in Plainfield and the Assistant Principal Jean Agrentomkin along with the Queen City Charter School in Plainfield for allowing them to read to the youth. She said it was a great interaction with the children and a chance to Reminisce

reading the Dr. Seuss books again. She thanked them for the invitation and said she is looking forward to doing it again next year.

Freeholder Estrada thanked Freeholder Kowalski for attending the Pedestrian Safety campaign. He said this is not only a program in Union County. He said it is a NJDOT project said this is the second wave and Elizabeth was one of the City's chosen. Freeholder Estrada was pleased to announce that the results from the first one has made a difference of the lives of the City's that were chosen in the first wave. He said they are hoping to lower the number of accidents on Routes 1&9.

Freeholder Estrada explained the reason he voted no for Resolutions 2016-206: He said in reviewing the Position Control, he found that we are losing the opportunity to fill positions with minorities, adding that this position's salary is substantial. In reference to Resolution 2016-207, he stated that it applies to a residency waiver. He feels that right sizing for minorities, women, blacks, Asians and Latino have a chance to play a role and those already in the office should have the opportunity to play the role. He urged his colleagues to balance out those that are hired.

Freeholder Mirabella spoke about Narcan Training. He said when properly administering the drug, Narcan, it can prevent a potentially legal overdose of heroin or prescription opioids. He said there are free, confidential Narcan training session sponsored by Union County with JSAS healthcare and Prevention Links. He said there is a session on March 21st in Scotch Plains and another is scheduled for Aril 18th in Union Township.

Freeholder Mirabella reminded everyone that the Sensory Friendly Theatre series is continuing on Sunday, March 20th with the popular "rootsy rock and roll" of Brady Rymer and the Little Band that Could. He said the show is designed so that everyone can have a great time, especially persons with sensory sensitivities. He stated that the shows take place at the Union County Performing Arts Center in Rahway.

County Manager Faella responded to the Summit representative, stating that he met with the new Mayor of Summit, Nora Radest and there was a positive and productive meeting and they pledged to work together to maximize services for the residences and to share and expand shared services.

Chairman Bergen stated that he recently joined Senator Lesniak, Director Guzzo and more than 60 members of the Clergy, non-profits and social workers to launch the Senator's pilot program which enables food stamp recipients to keep their benefits while looking for work or being trained. He said the other purpose of the rally was to protect the poor from cuts to Food Stamps. He stated that Senator Lesniak's pilot program is unique in that it leverages private donations from foundations and is matched by Federal dollars.

Chairman Bergen stated that the pilot program came about because of news that as many as 11,000-20,000 new Jersey residents and as many as 1500 in Union County could lose their food stamp benefits. He added that this is the result of the Christie Administration's decision not to seek an extension or waiver of benefits from the Federal Government for single, able-bodied adults from 18 to 49 without dependent receive food stamp benefits. He said the launch of the pilot program is also timely given that March is National Nutrition Month, a campaign that focuses on the importance of food choices. He said as a result of the County's press conference, the State agreed to move the deadline back to the end of the summer before our residents could potentially lose benefits. He added that putting food on the table is a human right and the fight will continue to protect the most vulnerable residents from being hurt by callous cuts to this invaluable program.

Chairman Bergen announced that the Union County St. Patrick's Day Parade is Saturday and they are predicting good weather. He said it is a great event and urged the public to attend.

Chairman Bergen congratulated Freeholder Jalloh on the birth of his son.
