# Union County's Watchung Reservation Sensory Friendly Trail



The new Sensory Trail is located in front of the Trailside Visitor Center and is accessible to all residents, allowing them to enjoy the beautiful natural surroundings. The trail is open seven days a week from dawn to dusk.

The Watchung Reservation Sensory Trail is a 0.3 mile loop with a central gazebo. The trail includes a Braille trail loop with guide ropes, featuring multiple stops to learn about the local flora and fauna with 3D reliefs and Braille for the visually impaired.



Interpretive signage includes two talking audio kiosks highlighting the natural and human history of the Watchung Reservation. Featured on these kiosks are sounds of nature, including bird songs, insect sounds, and Native American flute music.

The central gazebo offers a sensory play area to attract children and encourage exploration and discovery. Sensory stimulation is provided through sensory gardens, musical components and nature-themed play structures designed to meet the physical, social and cognitive needs of different age groups. All of these elements along the trail provide tactile experiences and create opportunities to enjoy the touch, sound and smells of nature.





The Union County Board of Chosen Freeholders invites you to visit Trailside Nature and Science Center to experience over 4,500 square feet of interactive environmental exhibits. Take part in one of the many unique and educational programs designed to spark an appreciation of nature for both you and your child. Trailside's location in the scenic Watchung Reservation provides the perfect classroom for fun while learning about the environment and the natural world around us.

## Hours of operation are 12 - 5 p.m. daily.

# **TODDLER TIME**

Sensory hikes, stories, crafts and activities to acquaint adults and children with the natural world. Dress for outdoors.

Please register for this class using the adult's name.

**BRING:** A baby carrier or sling; strollers are <u>not</u> recommended.

WHO: Adult with child/children up to three years of age. Old-

er children will not be permitted to attend.

Oct. 4,
Art in Nature - Everything in nature has a unique color, shape and pattern. Discover nature's beauty on our hike as we search for heart-shaped leaves, "popcorn" berries, camouflaged tree bark and much more. Make leaf rubbings and clay impressions using materials we collect.

Oct. 11 Monarchs to Mexico - Find out about these incredible insects that travel to Mexico for a long winter *siesta*. Take a look at their life cycle, visit Trailside's butterfly garden and search outdoors for these beautiful butterflies.

Oct. 18, Senses of the Season - The sights, smells, and sounds of 19 or 20 nature change with the seasons. Take a hike to find out what the fall season is all about by using four of your five senses! Make a craft out of natural materials collected on the hike to take home.

Oct. 25
Blowin' in the Wind - ...floating on the water, stuck on an animal's fur. Seeds have different ways of traveling to new places to grow. Hike through field and forest to find cones, nuts, berries, fruits and pods.

Nov. 89 or 10Short or Tall - Take a look around, what do you see?Who is that, taller than me? Find out how you measure up to the tallest tree and the shortest animal. Have fun comparing heights of plants, animals and people!

#### Toddler Time continued...

Nov. 15 The 1, 2, 3's of Trailside - Get ready to count every-16 or 17 thing in nature from snowflakes and paw prints to seeds and rocks. Make a counting book of your own to take home.

Nov. 29, What's the Shape? - Hunt for hexagons, search for circles and seek out squares as we investigate shapes in nature. Have fun on a scavenger hunt to find a mitten shaped leaf, a heart shaped petal, a rectangular tree trunk and a triangular rock.

Dec. 6 Black Bears of NJ - New Jersey has only one bear, the black bear. Bring your teddy bear (or favorite stuffed animal) on a walk to look for black bear snacks and hiding places. Compare your foot to a bear track and find out how bears prepare for winter.



# TWO OF US

An interactive program encouraging nature discovery through hikes and other indoor/outdoor activities.

Oct. 2 The Art of Nature - Nature is art that is all around us.

Learn or 3 how the natural world inspires art and discover the different kinds of natural materials that can be used to make an artistic piece of work. Take a hike to collect natural items such as leaves, sticks and rocks and learn how to use them as tools to create a masterpiece to decorate your house.

Oct. 9 Monarch Migration - Monarch butterflies are off to Mexico for the winter. Learn about their lifecycle, from egg to butterfly, and look for them sipping nectar in gardens and meadows around Trailside.

Oct. 16 What Do You Sense? - Fall is a wonderful time to listen, see, smell and touch. Take a walk to look and listen for chirping birds, colorful leaves and prickly and tickly pine needles. Find out how animals use their senses to survive in the wild.

Oct. 23 Movin' On - Plants spread their seeds in many ways. Take a walk to the meadow as we search for seeds with "wings," seeds that hitch a ride on animals and seeds that are eaten by birds, mammals and insects.

Oct. 30 The Colors of Fall - Hike through the Watchung Reservation or 31 in search of red, yellow, orange and purple fall colors. Learn why the leaves change color in autumn. Collect leaves to make a colorful fall craft to take home

Oct. 31 Fall Fun - Hike around the reservation to see the changes that occur during fall. Explore the woods for fall colors, and look for animals preparing for winter along the way.

Nov. 7 Inch By Inch - Compare and contrast the many different sizes of animals and plant life found in the wild. Learn how the size of an animal or plant helps it survive.

**Nov. 14** Numbers in Nature - How many points are on a snow flake? How many seeds do dandelions produce? Which plant has leaves of three? Look at leaves, open seeds, investigate insects and count the numerous gifts nature has to offer.

Nov. 28 Searching for Shapes - Can you find a leaf that is like a heart? A tree with a circular hole? Have fun looking for different shapes in nature. See if you can find circles, squares, stars, rectangles, triangles and diamonds on a hike through the reservation.

Dec. 5 Going on a Bear Hike - Bring your teddy bear and learn the bear facts. Do black bears live in the Watchung Reservation? What do they eat? Where do they go in winter? Make a special bear craft to take home.



# AFTERSCHOOL EXPLORATIONS GRADE SCHOOL PROGRAM



A drop off program designed to acquaint your child with nature explorations, hikes and outdoor activities.

WHO: 1st - 3rd graders.

WHEN: Thursdays, 3:30-4:45 PM

FEE: Per class: IC - \$10/child OC - \$12/child

- Oct. 4 Stream Stroll Knowing what types of animals live in stream helps us to determine the quality of the water. Search for insect larvae, salamanders and crayfish. Discover how they help predict the water quality.
- Oct. 11 Minibeasts Who lives in the soil? Discover which creatures are the gardeners, hunters and garbage collectors. Look for them under rocks and logs and find out why they are important.
- Oct. 18 Hawk Watch Search the sky for migrating birds of prey. Look for hawks, falcons and, if we are lucky, we may see a bald eagle! Find out what makes these birds special and learn why they migrate.
- Oct. 25 Bats in the Belfry Learn the myths and misconceptions of this often misunderstood animal. Discover what New Jersey bats eat and how they use echolocation to catch food.



Afterschool Explorations continued....

- **Nov. 1** Rocks Rock! Hike the "geology trail" and discover old lava flows, glacial rocks and remains of inland seas. Collect and identify specimens to take home.
- **Nov. 8 Eco Artist -** Each season brings new beauty; snowflakes, flowers, rainbows, and colorful leaves. Celebrate the change of nature through arts and crafts that capture the magnificence of each season.
- Nov. 15 Lenape Lifestyles Experience life as a Lenape Native American. Listen to stories in a life-sized wigwam, play games like corn darts and hold real artifacts. Search outdoors for plants the Lenape used for medicines, food and cordage.
- Nov. 29 Behind the Scenes Learn what it takes to care for Trailside's resident animals. Meet snakes, turtles, fish, and walking sticks up close while learning about their care, behavior, and feeding habits.
- **Dec. 6** Prepare for Winter Discover how some of Trailside's resident plants and animals deal with winter. Learn how deep snow can actually help in winter survival and go outside in search of winter animal homes, hideouts, and food.

Just a few decades ago, peregrine falcons disappeared east of the Mississippi River - yet today we can celebrate over 30 active falcon nests in *New Jersey* alone; with one located on the roof of the Union County Courthouse in Elizabeth! The peregrine falcon, also known as the duck hawk, is the largest falcon in the state. It is the

world's fastest animal, capable of flying at speeds over 200 miles an hour.
